At this point in the session nearly 500 bills have been introduced in the senate and nearly 700 in the Assembly. Twenty or 30 new bills came in on Tuesday, even though it was the 51st day of the session. Many more bills are in the hands of legislators awaiting introduction. The hope and effort of the legislature is to try in every way to bring matters to a conclusion by the 70th day. The money committees, who hold the key, are about finished with their hearings and will begin to finalize their budget action. Recent income figures show a rather bleak picture for state revenues. The state is in the midst of a considerable economic recession at the present time.

**VERY ILL** — Mary Jo Ream, 19-year-old daughter of Joe and Fran Ream, has been in a cardiac unit in various hospitals since Dec. 26, and she is still a very ill girl.

Her mother says that she has no known heart disease, but doctors, specialists from all over the country, have not been able to diagnose her trouble nor what to do about it. She has Ventricular Tachycardia (I couldn't find that in the dictionary).

As soon as her heart was stabilized, she was taken by private plane, with some arrangements being made through the Governor's office, to the UCLA medical center in Calif.

She and her parents were there eight weeks, and returned home Thursday by air ambulance, when Miss Ream was put back in Sunrise hospital. The flight was made with a cardiologist, a nurse and some doctors on board, along with all the equipment necessary for her to survive.

Her case has been reviewed by doctors in Washington, D.C., and specialists from the Cedars of Lebanon Hospital, but they cannot find what is making her heart act like it does.

Because of her need for constant care, the Reams plan to take a crash course in operating the heart equipment, rent some equipment, and bring her home where they can care for her themselves. Because of the need of constant care and constant equipment, the hospital bills have mounted to a prohibi-

tive cost.

Mary Jo would enjoy hearing from her friends in Sunrise hospital.

## Topics for Taxpayers

Legislators were shocked last week when the "money" committees pointed out that the spending proposals before the legislature, if enacted, would put the state almost \$12 million into a deficit position. Three things combined to bring about that situation, and about only one can something be done — well, maybe two:

First, the legislators are understandably apprehensive about the failure of state revenues to show the growth rate that most of the forecasters expected. As second quarter figures for gaming tax revenues and sales tax revenues were compiled the half-year totals were disappointing. (It should be remembered that revenues coming in the first quarter of 1971 reflect the business done in the state in the last quarter of 1970.)

Second, the committees are finding very little "fat" in the budget submitted by Governor Mike O'Callaghan. It is normal to expect that the legislature can trim a couple of million dollars out of the governor's budget, and re-allocate that money to activities preferred by the legislature. Not only is there almost no room in the budget, but some of the agencies

are screaming bloody murder about the "shabby treatment" according to them by the executive budget. Principal screamers are the education agencies — the school districts and the University system.

Third, the legislators have offered a lot of spending proposals "all their own." Some of them (perhaps a substantial number) were offered for political effect, with little expectation that the state would have the money to fund the program. But some, also, are designed to fund a very worthwhile set of programs.

The crisis, if it turns out to be a crisis, comes about because the executive budget (lean as it appears to be) contemplates the spending of some \$3 million more than the state expects to take in from taxes. Then, too, the Governor did not provide for an estimated \$1.4 million that it will take to fund the activities of the 1973 legislature. Then, too, legislators have forecast a need for deficiency appropriations of \$2.5 million when the 1973 session opens. That forecast is probably "high" in view of the Governor's determination to have the state live within its means.

Some of the legislators on the money committees were

shocked to learn a couple of weeks ago that nowhere in state government is there a "management engineering" team or function watching government activity from day to day to try to improve the efficiency of operation. Sporadic efforts are made with special, expensive studies but there is no continuing activity in that field. The Governor asked for \$50,000 for a special "in-house" study of efficiency, but that idea has a serious weakness. Self-evaluation is seldom conducive to results.

An informed estimate last week, by a competent analyst, asserted that a management engineering team would cost about \$150,000 for the biennium; and could save the cost of more than 30 state employees which would turn a net profit of \$150,000. The idea is worth exploration.

A modern management technique used by the State Board of Finance during the past two years has demonstrated the worth of independent management studies.



### Campers Must Be Registered

Owners of campers who have ignored the law or otherwise failed to register their vehicles with the Clark County Assessor's office and meet their personal property tax obligations are in for a surprise.

Up to now, it has been difficult to locate such owners, generally owners of campers brought in from out-of-state, but a method has now been evolved where the great majority, if not all, of campers in the county will be located and reported to the assessor's office.

Lou Fry, head of the personal property division of the Clark County Assessor's office, said that legislation passed two years ago made it mandatory for all campers to be taxed, and the law stipulated that penalties and interest be added if the

tax was not paid during the month of July.

Although new sales have been and are being reported by dealers in campers,

many people owning campers prior to the passage of the law have, through design or ignorance, ignored the fact that they are subject to the tax, the same as owners of mobile homes and trailers are. The longer they wait to register their vehicles, the higher the interest and pen-

alties prescribed by the new State law.

Registration procedures are simple, he added. Camper - owners should bring with them a bill or contract of sale and other pertinent papers.

# Talk about ghosts

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This article was originally given as a serious speech before the Basic Toastmasters Club of Henderson, in Dec. 1964.

The question of the existence of ghosts is almost as controversial as politics, so right at the beginning I wish to state that I have never had any supernatural experience of my own, and therefore can claim to be impartial on this subject. Ghosts can be divided into several types, as follows:

1. Poltergeists - the term is German, and means "noisy ghost." This is the type that gets the newspaper headlines. There are knocks on the furniture, things appear and disappear and objects are thrown about. Curiously enough, a poltergeist may not be a true ghost at all. It has been found that in most cases of poltergeists there is an adolescent in the house. Now adolescence is a period of storm and stress, in which the character formed in childhood is shattered and reformed, and it is believed that in some way the adolescent temporarily acquires the power to produce these phenomena. However, it is not under his conscious control, although in a few instances it apparently was.

2. Hallucination - again, this is not a true ghost. It arises purely from a person's own mind, so that he projects a mental image and "Sees" it. Hallucinations may be sight only, or be

both by sight and sound, and even smell is involved. 3. The third type is rather similar to the second, and doesn't seem to have a name - I call it the "cinema reel" type. In this case, a ghost is seen doing the same thing by several people, who may be either alone or together. The ghost may, for example, come into a room, sit down and take off his shoes, then vanish. Sometimes more than one sequence of events is involved. The classic case is the ghost that walks along a castle battlements at night. Sometimes the ghost is heard and not seen, though this is rare.

Perhaps the most famous case of this is that of the battle of Edge Hill, which was an indecisive battle fought in the 1640's between Charles I of England and Cromwell. For many years thereafter on the anniversary of the battle, travellers across the battlefield would become aware of a low confused sound, which rapidly swelled until it became the tumult of a battle - the shouts of men, the clash of swords, and the screams of dying men. Yet they could see absolutely nothing - even on a bright moonlit night.

This was an annual event for over 50 years after the battle, when it gradually died away. However, even as late as the 1950's some people claimed to have heard the sounds. The tentative explanation for this is that it seems to occur whenever a person has lived "hard" - lived under a period of trial and stress. The best known American example is that of Lincoln, who is said to haunt the White House. After the recent election results, he's probably got good reason to!

(Author Note: - This was written right after the 1964 election) It is though that under the trying circumstances the place somehow becomes saturated with the person's personality, so that it operates rather like a storage battery - the minds of living people connect the circuit, so to speak, and the sequence proceeds - the ghost appears, goes through his routine, then disappears. In support of this theory, the ghost tends to appear less and less frequently as time goes on.

4. The fourth class of

ghosts are the ones on which the religion of spiritualism is founded - the alleged survival of death by a person's personality. These ghosts are contacted through mediums, so called because they "intermediate" between the living and the dead. However, by its very nature spiritualism is wide open to fraud.

For example, if you are willing to pay \$100 to talk to your late dear Aunt Mary, someone is surely going to be around to relieve you of the money. It's human nature. Furthermore, those who go to seances are often in a state of severe emotional shock - they want to believe. Nor do I feel that they can be criticized too much, under the circumstances.

Because of the widespread fraud, it is very difficult to obtain good evidence on the genuineness of this type of ghost. The biggest objection to this is that, although people have been leaving messages in code to be solved after their death - by providing the solution to the code through a medium - there has never been an authentic case of this happening. And these days, almost any code can be broken by a computer.

However, there are instances which come very close to proving that the human personality does survive bodily death. The most famous of these occurred during automatic writing sequences. Automatic writing is simple, you merely take a pencil in your hand, withdraw conscious control from the hand, and see what happens, if anything. Most people apparently deliberately write with the other hand to divert their attention.

In this particular experiment, which went on for years, several well educated people were involved. About 5 were in England, in different parts, and one lived in India. There was never any opportunity for these people to get together before the events I am about to describe, so fraud can be virtually excluded. These experiments had been in progress for some time when a person named Dr. Verral, who was interested in them but not directly involved, died.

Shortly thereafter one of the participants in the automatic writing got a message which purported to be from

this Dr. Verral, saying in effect that he would prove that he had survived bodily death. Shortly thereafter the five automatic writers began receiving fragments of material which somehow or other were related to each other and dealt with a common theme. After large amounts of material had accumulated one man devoted years to fitting the fragments together - aided by some hints from Dr. Verral through the automatic writing.

It was finally found that all these fragments were quotations from, allusions to, or descriptions of, a classic Greek legend, the "Ear of Dionysius." This was possibly known in detail by half a dozen people in the entire world. Now Dr. Verral was one of the world's experts in classical Greek and Roman literature, and would thus have been familiar with this legend.

And then the alleged Dr. Verral said that amongst his personal effects would be found a book with this legend in it, with certain passages marked. He provided a detailed description of the book, its location, and the passages marked. All these were correct - in fact, the book was hidden behind others, and probably would never have been found under normal circumstances.

What makes this type of evidence so unusual is the method employed - the de-

liberate splitting up of information to prove that one mind was organizing the communications. We may draw a parallel - suppose I have here a crossword puzzle; I mix it up, then give a handful of pieces to A, another handful to B, another to C, and so on; by itself each handful of pieces is useless; but put them all together and a clear pattern emerges, a pattern deliberately selected by somebody.

The only plausible alternative, which is surely even more fantastic, is that the minds of these 5 people, who had never met, must have somehow got together, on a subject they knew nothing about, and had apportioned the information between them! That is why the "cross correspondences," as they are called, have convinced those who have studied them in detail that the only possible explanation is the existence of ghosts, or personalities of once - living people.

In conclusion, I have classified the various types of ghosts and described them to you. As to whether ghosts do exist, well nobody really knows - but sooner or later, everybody finds out!
