

"The same forces that fought the dog racing bill last vear have warned me they're going to do it again this year -except Howard Hughes,' Hal Smith told this writer last night in a telephone call between Smith's legislative of-

fice and the Home News. "In fact," Smith continued, 'they're (members of the assembly) kidding me on two points about the bill. They're saving if anyone brings Howard Hughes back to Nevada, it'll be Smith with his dog bill. They're also making cracks from the bill's number, which happens to be 666. They're saying-Sick, Sick,

Last year Hughes hired Tom Bell and Jimmy Snyder to lobby against the bill when it came up in the assembly, after it had cleared the sen-

The Hughes pressure plus the northern Nevada gambler's association pressure

"The Northern Gamblers are the ones who notified me they'll be fighting it again this year," Smith said last night.

Smith explains the bill actually has more strength now because it is written to be a charter amendment to the Henderson city charter whereby the city, if the bill passes into law, would have the power to license and regulate greyhound racing within the

city limits until July 1, 1976. This excludes other cities from being able to have dog racing, and this, according to Smith, may win over some strength from northerners who feared Reno or Elko or Winnemucca, would start dog racing too.

Jim Smalley, Henderson's other assemblyman, joined with Smith in introducing the bill to the legislature.

The assembly will vote on it first, this time, Smith said. Last year the senate had the bill first and passed it without a problem. It is not expected L. R. Brown, who is single, to be a problem in the senate should the assembly vote yes.
