Every child has the right to survival, protection, development and participation. We fight to make children's rights a reality worldwide.

For more than 100 years, we have been working with children.

Save the Children is an international NGO that works to make children's rights to survival, development, protection and participation a reality worldwide. It was established in the UK in 1919 and is currently at work in approximately 120 countries. The UN and the governments of many countries have a high regard for Save the Children as a pioneer of children's rights, and we have achieved breakthroughs in the way the world treats children. Save the Children Japan was established in 1986. We are active in international programs in fields such as health and nutrition and education. When conflicts or natural disasters occur, we provide emergency and humanitarian responses. In Japan, we have actively addressed issues of child poverty and child abuse and have also conducted various programs in response to large-scale disasters such as the Great East Japan Earthquake and the Kumamoto Earthquake. Through these programs, we work to make children's rights a reality.

Foreword

In 2020, children around the world were adversely affected by the spread of COVID-19. In both developed and developing countries, curfews and containment measures significantly impacted children's lives, escalating poverty and domestic violence, and depriving them of educational opportunities.

In these circumstances, Save the Children provided support to approximately 45 million children in 120 countries around the world to safeguard children's rights to survival, protection, development and participation.

In particular, we deployed our COVID-19 responses in 87 countries around the world including Japan. We reached approximately 29.5 million people, including 11.8 million children, with support for education and livelihoods as well as learning activities to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and other infectious diseases.

Internationally, in addition to emergency assistance for the pandemic, we continued to provide emergency and humanitarian assistance to children in Syria, Yemen, and Rohingya refugees affected by prolonged conflicts and violence. We also supported children made vulnerable by socio-economic disparities.

In Japan, in response to the enactment of the revised Child Abuse Prevention Act in April 2020, which clearly prohibits physical punishment by parents, we conducted awareness-raising activities on parenting without physical punishment through social media campaigns and online events. In addition, we distributed food to single-parent families, provided financial grants to high school students, and supported after-school children's clubs. Furthermore, during the heavy rains in July, we worked closely with the local community and the government to provide emergency and reconstruction assistance.

Throughout the challenges of this year, I felt that a willingness to support others experiencing difficulty had spread throughout Japan and around the world. I am very glad that we were able to convey that individual willingness in the form of support for those in need.

In 2021, Save the Children will continue to strive for a world that can attain all children's rights, listen to children's voices, and conduct activities for children together with children. We look forward to your continued support and cooperation in the future.

Emergency and Humanitarian Response

For children and local communities affected by natural disasters and humanitarian crises, Save the Children swiftly responds to meet their immediate needs, enabling them to return to and rebuild their lives.

Health and Nutrition

To ensure that all children and their families can access quality health services, Save the Children provides assistance, including healthcare for pregnant women, mothers and newborns; prevention and treatment of infectious diseases and malnutrition; and strengthening of health systems.

Education

In order for all children to receive quality education, Save the Children implements programs that improve learning environments, provide capacity development opportunities for teachers, raise awareness in local communities and promote pre-school education programs.

Child Protection

We promote child protection measures in close collaboration with various stakeholders such as local governments and communities, children, and their caregivers to protect children from violence, abuse, and exploitation, and cultivate environments in which children can grow up safely and securely.

Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR)

Save the Children strengthens DRR structures of local communities so that children can act independently when disasters occur and their voices are reflected in DRR policy and practice. We promote child-centered disaster risk reduction.

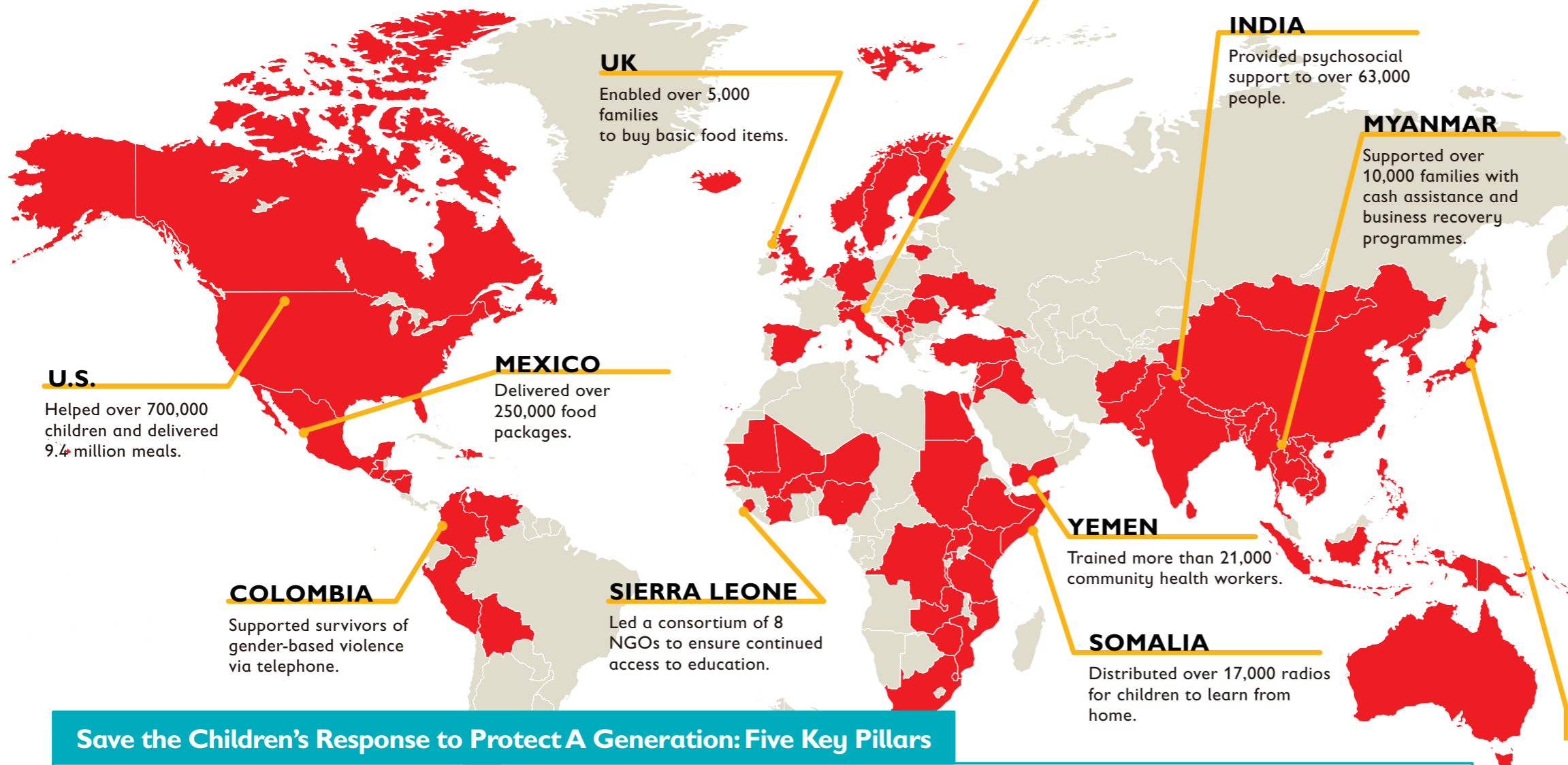
Child Poverty

We are working to end child poverty by providing direct support, raising public awareness and engaging in advocacy. Our aim is to ensure that all children have access to the physical possessions, services and opportunities necessary for them to live their lives and develop, so that they can fulfill their potential.

Our COVID-19 Response

Supported over 11 million children in 87 countries

COVID-19 is still spreading in Japan and throughout the world. As the global community faced this unprecedented situation, Save the Children provided emergency responses to the pandemic for children in Japan and 86 countries around the world. By the end of December 2020, we had reached 29.5 million people including 11.8 million children.

Mental Health and Psychosocial Support for Children

The ongoing impact of the Syrian crisis, as well as lockdowns and school closures due to the COVID-19 outbreak had negative effects on children's mental health and well-being, and also heightened the risk of child abuse and violence against children. The number of refugees unable to access health care continued to increase. We contextualized and updated the existing "Psychological First Aid (PFA) for Children" module to provide mental health and psychosocial support to children in Jordan, and worked with the Jordanian government, local health care facilities, and schools to roll out the program nationwide.

Our Response in Japan



The COVID-19 pandemic continued in Japan and economic conditions worsened. The national government declared a state of emergency and called for all the schools to be closed. The impact on children in Japan was significant. In response, Save the Children delivered food supplies to 2,501 single-parent households, raised awareness through our media platforms of psychosocial care for children, and provided cash assistance to high school students.

International Programs

Emergency and Humanitarian Response



Save the Children responded to the humanitarian crises in Syria, Yemen, Afghanistan, South Sudan, Democratic Republic of the Congo, and of displaced Rohingya people in Bangladesh. Our responses included support for education, child protection, health and nutrition, and distribution of emergency relief supplies. We also provided emergency responses to the COVID-19 outbreak in these countries.

Education



Save the Children is committed to ensuring that all children, including children with disabilities and children from economically disadvantaged families, have equal access to quality inclusive education. In Mongolia, we strengthened the capacity of teachers to provide educational support tailored to children's individual needs. Opportunities for home tutoring and learning kits were also offered to children who face difficulties accessing education.

Health and Nutrition



We work to prevent and treat malnutrition and infectious diseases and to build societies where everyone has access to quality health services. In Uganda and Vietnam, we provided technical guidance to improve agricultural productivity, as well as nutritional guidance to local farmers to improve maternal and child nutrition. In addition, we promoted health checkups for women during and after pregnancy.

Child Protection



In Mongolia, we strengthened the capacity of child protection teams within local governments working to prevent and respond to cases of child abuse. In addition to advocating for stronger and more sustainable child protection and child rights mechanisms, we conducted nationwide campaigns through social media, TV, and newspapers to ban corporal punishment.

Child Poverty



For children and their families affected by the August 2020 Beirut Blast in Lebanon, we offered psychosocial support and helped them secure safe accommodation. In addition, with the help of the Inochi Mirai Fund, we provided rapid assistance to children affected by natural disasters and conflicts around the world.



Save the Children works to ensure that all children have access to the goods, services, and opportunities necessary to fulfill their potential. In Mongolia, we provided entrepreneurship education for youth living in remote areas. In cooperation with local governments and chambers of commerce and industry, we established councils to develop curriculum and educational materials tailored to each region.



In Myanmar, we promoted safe childbirth and the health of newborns by collaborating with health authorities to strengthen the health system by training auxiliary midwives. In Vietnam, Myanmar, and Laos, we worked to develop capacity by training healthcare staff and providing medical equipment in order to improve the health of mothers and children of ethnic minorities.

Disaster Risk Reduction



We worked with local communities and governments on child-centered disaster risk reduction. In Uganda, we implemented a program to enable communities to build resilience against natural disasters and climate change. In Thailand, we worked to prevent water-related accidents among children, and in Indonesia, we promoted road safety for children and youth.

Domestic Programs

Ending Child Poverty

Currently, one in seven children in Japan lives in relative poverty. In 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic had a material financial impact on households with children, worsening the situation of child poverty. We provided cash assistance, raised public awareness and made policy proposals with children's participation seeking better solutions to ending child poverty.

Prevention of Child Abuse



We have been working to prevent child abuse so that all children are protected from violence and grow up in a safe and secure environment. In 2020, the revised laws to prohibit corporal punishment by parents and guardians came into effect in Japan. Taking advantage of this milestone, we worked to raise public awareness by launching a dedicated website, conducting online events and proposing policies to members of parliament, relevant ministries and agencies.

Responses to COVID-19

COVID-19 Response for Children

Survey of Children

The Japanese government called for schools to close from March 2, 2020. We conducted a survey of children about school closures and 1,422 children responded. Children's views were expressed in a letter submitted to members of parliament and relevant ministries requesting that they focus on supporting children during the pandemic.

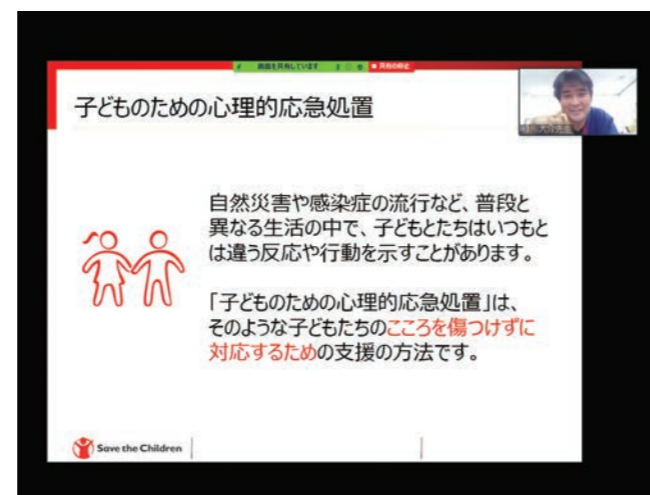


Support for After-school Clubs (Gakudo)

We provided cash assistance to 250 after-school programs (Gakudo) nationwide which cared for children amid the declared state of emergency and school closures. In addition, we offered seminars on health management and Psychological First Aid (PFA) for Children to create a safe environment.



Domestic Emergency Programs



Given the increasing frequency of natural disasters, we needed to ready ourselves for the double disasters of COVID-19 and natural catastrophes. To support well-being and development of children affected by disasters, we raised public awareness and offered training on mental health and psychosocial support and provided useful information for supporting children during disasters.

Single-parent Household Support Boxes

In late-May and June, we delivered boxes of food, such as rice, snacks, vacuum-packed and ready-made foods, and toys if requested, to a total of 1,320 single-parent households. As well, we delivered similar support to 1,181 households at the end of 2020 when the pandemic intensified.



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Cash Assistance for High School Students

From August to November 2020, we provided cash assistance of 30,000 yen per person to 400 high school students from 355 single-parent households in Tokyo whose income had decreased due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. We also requested that the Japanese government and Tokyo metropolitan government increase their financial support based on the results of our survey of cash assistance recipients.



Raising awareness of Mental Health and Psychosocial Support

We disseminated information on mental health and psychosocial support in collaboration with the Disaster Psychiatric Assistance Team (DPAT) of the Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare, the Japanese Society of Certified Clinical Psychologists, and the Japanese Association of Certified Public Psychologists. In addition, we offered online seminars on Psychological First Aid (PFA) for Children to child practitioners from civil society organizations and to workers of after-school programs (Gakudo).



Emergency Grant Assistance for Civil Society Organizations in Japan

Save the Children was selected as one of the organizations to distribute funds using dormant deposits within the COVID-19 emergency response project of the Japan Network for Public Interest Activities (JANPIA). In October, we started providing year-long assistance to 17 civil society organizations supporting children affected by the pandemic.

Emergency Responses to Natural Disasters

Emergency Response to July 2020 Heavy Rain

Emergency Response in Collaboration with Local Organizations

We promptly launched emergency responses primarily in Fukuoka, Kumamoto, Saga, and Oita, where especially severe damage had been reported, delivering relief supplies focused on the needs of children in the affected areas. Due to the impact of COVID-19, our emergency response was provided remotely in partnership with local organizations, without deploying our own staff members.



Safe back to school after the disaster

In many areas that had suffered devastating damage, nursery schools and schools were forced to reopen before an environment suitable for childcare and learning had been restored. We collaborated with local governments and partner organizations to provide necessary school supplies and equipment in order to help create environments where children could feel safe and secure.

Typhoon Hagibis (Typhoon No. 19) Recovery Programs

Right to learn after the disaster

We provided cash assistance to 200 students in the final year of elementary or middle school in Marumori Town, Miyagi and Iwaki City, Fukushima, which were affected by Typhoon Hagibis in 2019. In addition, we made repairs to facilities used by after-school programs (Gakudo) and replaced essential equipment. In Marumori Town, we also offered transport for children to go on a field trip in order to ensure their right to learn after the disaster.

Supported Well-Being and Healthy Development of Children

We made repairs to nursery school facilities and replaced essential equipment to ensure the safety of children after the disaster in Marumori Town, Miyagi and Iwaki City, Fukushima. In addition, we collaborated with Miyagi Disaster Mental Health Care Centre to provide training on Psychological First Aid (PFA) for Children for nursery school teachers and children's parents.

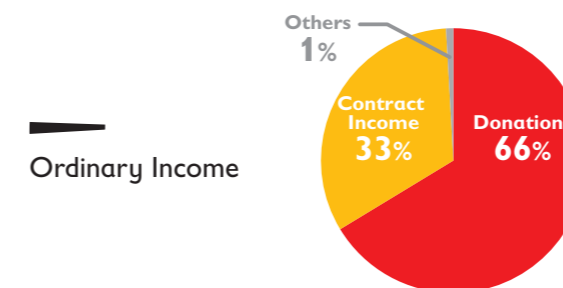
